

NOAA: National Weather Service

t's probably coincidence that NOAA, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and Noah, the biblical patriarch and builder of the Ark are homonyms, meaning they are pronounced the same, but spelled differently. Or was NOAA named that way on purpose since Genesis details how Noah survived the flood and 40 days of rain? Either way, the Jericho Water District is assisting NOAA, an Operating Unit of the US Department of Commerce, in a scientific study collecting data on rainfall...and that's no coincidence!

NOAA's mission is to "provide weather, water and climate data, forecasts and warnings for the protection of life and property and enhancement of the national economy." District personnel will collect data on local rainfall and report that information as an authoritative resource to help enable the most accurate, hyper local recording and forecasting. Collection of other information, in particular temperature data, may be a future cooperation. "We will be working with the NWS Cooperative Program Manager Timothy Morrin, "JWD Chairman Thomas A. Abbate said. "Equipment will be installed at the District's main office on Convent Road, and some JWD staff will receive National Weather Service standards training.

Rainfall is measured today in much the same way it was done back when the National Weather Service started, and the District is pleased to collaborate. "We'll keep everyone posted," Chairman Abbate stated, "and for more information, a visit the National Weather Service website (http://www.weather.gov/timeline) can provide a great deal of fascinating information."

Longtime Commissioner and Chairman Anthony Cincotta has decided to step down. A Commissioner since 1990, Mr. Cincotta has been instrumental in ensuring the maintenance of District infrastructure, acquiring property for future District use and the installation of four new wells to meet increased demand. During his tenure, the average day rate demand increased over 30%, the peak day rate reached 37.6 million gallons, and more than 2,000 new water services were installed. We are grateful for his long and dedicated service.

Another ch-ch-change is new Commissioner James S. Asmus who was elected Commissioner in the December election. A Svosset resident since 1984, Commissioner Asmus brings a wealth of business and financial expertise to his new position. Welcome aboard!

Most plumbing and sprinkler installation/maintenance companies have certified backflow testers and it's wise to check with them regarding testing. You can access a list of certified testers at: https://www.health.ny.gov/environmental/ water/drinking/cross/backflow_testers/nassau.htm

Once your tester has completed the test and filled out the certification form:

- 1 Submit copies to the Nassau County Health Department **AND** the Jericho Water District.
- **2** Make sure the form includes your JWD account number to facilitate recording of your test.
- **3** Test results should be submitted to the JWD by only one of the following:

Irrigate Wisely

Irrigation systems are intended to supplement precipitation not replace it. If rainfall is sufficient, irrigation systems should be shut off, either manually or automatically. For automatic shut off, make sure your rain sensor has been tested and is accurately measuring precipitation.



SHERLOCK?

Sprinkler systems are notoriously prone to leaks that generally go unobserved since most irrigation occurs in early mornings. Thousands of gallons of water are wasted, and unfortunately homeowners pay for it. To reduce the amount of water and dollars wasted, make sure your sprinkler systems are inspected regularly. You don't have to be Sherlock Holmes to

see abnormally moist, soft or yellow spots in your lawn, or broken, clogged, dripping, sunken or tilted sprinkler heads!

HELPFUL HINTS

- Electrical storms and power outages can wreak havoc with your sprinkler system's programmable time clock, resulting in sprinklers being on more frequently and/or for greater lengths of time. Check your time clock settings to ensure that they are set according to the originally programmed schedule to meet your lawn's irrigation needs for each particular month.
- Program each irrigation zone based on different plant requirements, e.g. soil type, sun/shade exposure and lay of the land, flat or sloped surfaces.
- Change system activation time from 2 a.m. 6 a.m. when most sprinkler systems are on and stressing our system, to later morning or early evening.

Meet The Challenge Head On.


ater is precious. While the JWD is not in any danger of running out of water, the bigger picture, that of conservation for present and long term sustainability, must be considered. If this winter's dry weather pattern prevails through spring and summer, homeowners will be challenged to care for lawns, and the JWD will be challenged to meet increased water demand during the irrigation season.

Ordinances from Nassau County and the JWD that govern turf irrigation, gardens, shrubs and hedges are in effect all year round to ensure that adequate water pressure is always available for firefighting purposes, as well as personal use.

- Sprinkling is prohibited before April 1 and after November 1.
- Sprinkling is prohibited between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- Residents with even numbered or unnumbered residences may water only on even dates.
- Residents with odd numbered residences may water only on odd dates.
- Sprinkling is prohibited during periods of rainfall.
- Hoses must have a shut-off nozzle that is automatically selfclosing, requiring hand pressure on the valve to permit the flow of water.

The Jericho Water District requires:

- Permits must be filed for all new underground sprinkler systems or modifications of existing systems.
- All commercial/industrial properties (apartment complexes, condominiums, co-ops, schools, HOAs, etc.), may irrigate
 ONLY between 6 p.m. and midnight on their designated odd/even dates.
